

Phonics at West Hove Infants


Phonics - a simple overview

Phonics is a way of teaching children to read and spell quickly and skilfully. They are taught how to:

Recognise the sounds that each individual letter represents

Identify the sounds that different combinations of letters represent (e.g. 'ch' or 'ai')

Blend these sounds together from left to right to make a word





How we teach phonics

At West Hove Infants, we teach a systematic programme of phonics as outlined in **Letters and Sounds**, which supports speaking, listening, reading and writing.

Phonics teaches children what sound each letter makes – this is the first step in children learning how to read. Children will begin to recognise letters and the sounds they make, which they then use to blend sounds together for reading, and segment them when writing.

The school uses the Letters and Sounds programme, as well as using the **Jolly Phonics** approach in Reception, in conjunction with early reading skills. Jolly Phonics helps us to introduce letters and their corresponding sounds through stories, action, songs and jingles. These activities encourage all types of learners.

How we teach phonics



During Key Stage 1, the children build on this knowledge of Letters and Sounds by using Phonics Play resources, alongside other useful and engaging resources.

In Year One the children take part in a statutory phonics screening check in which they apply their phonics knowledge to read real and pseudo words.

In Year Two the children recap sounds taught in Year One with a

stronger focus on spellings and 'best bets'.



Intervention and Extension Groups






We love having parent/ carer helpers at West Hove Infants and invite volunteers in for an informal training on how to support phonics teaching in the classroom.


Helping your child at home...


Each week Year 1 and Year 2 send out phonics and/or spelling homework.

This is always based on what we have been learning in class and will include a different activity each week.


The children should be able to complete this fairly independently and may even be able to teach you a thing or two!



At West Hove Infant School we aim to nurture in the children a love of literature and language and the confidence to continue reading and writing throughout their lives. Children have access to a wide range of fiction and non-fiction books, as well as books which are sorted into colour coded bands, and are expected to read and share stories daily. They will be supported to read regularly throughout the day through all subjects and are taught not only to decode text but also to interpret and understand it. Guided reading sessions happen daily in every class and year group. All children have a Reading



Diary which parents / carers can complete to show that their child has read or shared a book at home. We deploy teaching support staff and parent volunteers to support with reading in school. In addition, we run an intervention programme for those children who need extra 'catch-up' support.

Phonics

Phonics is a way of teaching children to read and write. It is the ability to hear, identify, and manipulate sounds and understand the link between the sound (phoneme) and the way it is written (grapheme). We teach children to apply phonic knowledge as a first approach to reading.

At West Hove Infant School we teach phonics through high quality, systematic daily lessons with a range of opportunities for children to practise and apply their learning. We follow the Letters and Sounds programme, supplemented by Jolly phonics resources, actions and songs. Letters and Sounds is a phonics programme in which individual letters or letter sounds are 'blended' to form groups of letters or sounds, and those groups are then blended to form complete words.

Children are also taught to read and spell 'tricky words' – words with spellings that are unusual. These include the words 'to', 'was', 'said' and 'the'. 'Tricky words' are ones that we can't sound – so these words just
